Vanport Mosaic commemorates 70 years since flood

On a warm Memorial Day 70 years ago, Portland was forever transformed by Oregon's biggest natural disaster of the 20th century: The Vanport Flood.

It's a big anniversary, and that's why the Vanport Mosaic Festival is pulling out the stops for six days of activities that weave together fun, fascination, family and serious reflection.

It's all happening with events beginning Wednesday, May 23 and continuing through the Memorial Day holiday on Monday, May 28 at multiple venues that are specifically free of charge or kept at low-cost for the community.

Co-organizers Laura Lo Forti and Dam-

Transformed

aris Webb have created a rich program that combines storytelling, performance, history, physical activities and even a disaster preparedness workshop. The Royal Rosarians will also be planting a special commemorative rose at Peninsula Park, and the Rosarian planting is himself a Vanport

A big highlight for 2018 is a partnership with the Confluence Project, which promotes understanding of indigenous communities of the Columbia River through historic preservation and construction of a series of hiking trails stretching along the Washington side of the Columbia Gorge. The trails are vast and fascinating landscapes designed by architect Maya Lin, creator of the US Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Like the Vanport survivors who have contributed oral histories to the Vanport Mosaic project, Native American families

have joined voices in oral histories about their experiences. A fascinating panel of local indigenous leaders will be screening a film of these oral histories at the festival

Key to local tribes was loss of Celilo Village on the Columbia when the Dalles Dam was built in 1957. Before being flooded for the dam by the federal government, Celilo was considered the oldest sustained community on the North American continent. The damn also destroyed Celilo's huge waterfall, one of the most important tribal fishing spots and a center of the tribal

"We feel a sense of urgency right now because many of the elders who lived through these things are in their 80s and 90s," Lo Forti says. "We can't lose their stories because they have so much to teach us and that is how we really learn -- from

Assessed \$36 million for Gorge Fire

A Vancouver teenager playing with fireworks who started a fire that swept through the Columbia River Gorge last summer was ordered to pay over \$36 million in damages Monday, but because he is a juvenile the judge will allow payments to stop after 10 years if he completes probation, doesn't commit other offenses and complies with payment plans.

College Closing After 125 Years

Marylhurst University, a 125-year-old college based near Lake Oswego, announced Thursday it was closing because of declining enrollment. The oldest Catholic

university in the state attempted to carve out a niche serving professionals returning to college, but the school, which boasted 1,409 students just a few years ago, had plummeted to 743.

Police Shoot Man with Hatchet

Gresham police said two of its officers fatally shot a man who threatened them with a hatchet early Friday following a police chase and crash of the suspect's vehicle. The man who died at the scene was identified as Dmitri Bullard, 24.

Former Chief was Dishonest

Former Portland Police Chief Larry O'Dea's should lose his police certification for 10 years for dishonesty and three years for gross misconduct, a state police policy committee recommended Thursday. The actions follow the investigation of O'Dea's handling of an off-duty accidental shooting of his friend in 2016 and an employee's discrimination complaint against a co-worker.

Janet Jackson Icon Award

Janet Jackson gave her first televised performance in nine years at the Billboard Music Awards Sunday. She was honored as the first black woman to receive the Billboard Icon Award,



where she performed a trio of her songs, including "Nasty," ''If' And "Throb."

Trailblazing Royal Wedding



Britain's Prince Harry and biracial American actress Meghan Markle sealed their wedding vows in London Saturday in a groundbreaking ceremony that echoed to the sounds of a

fiery Chicago preacher, a soulful gospel choir and the first black winner of a prestigious British music prize, as a constellation of A-list Americans rubbed shoulders with the bluest-blooded of British royalty.

Paul Allen Backs Gun Control

Blazers and Seahawks owner Paul Allen indicated Monday that he is backing a Washington gun control ballot initiative with a \$1 million contribution. Initiative 1639 would raise the age to purchase automatic weapons to 21 while also creating an enhanced background check system. Allen tweeted the proposed law is a necessary and reasonable one.

Illicit Marijuana Targeted

The illicit marijuana market, organized crime, outlaw grows and operations that "pose a substantial risk of violence" will be targeted by federal prosecutors under new guidelines for cannabis enforcement in Oregon made public Friday. 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

Miracles Club to honor 85-year-old killed

The Miracles Club, a non-alcohol recovery assistance center serving the African American community, is mourning the death of local welder and fabricator Eugene C. Gora, 85, who was found murdered May 10 at his landmark red welding garage, located on the corner of Northeast Skidmore and Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard, adjacent to the center.

Executive Director Michael Booker announced Monday that the Miracles Club invites the community to join them for an informal public memorial service in Gora's honor on Sunday at 1:30 p.m. at the Miracles Club. Gora was a member of the organization where he made daily visits.

"He was a good guy. We were very saddened about

Gora was found dead in his welding shop where he also resided for many decades. His cause of death was determined to be homicidal violence by the Oregon State Medical Examiner and police have launched a homicide investigation. No arrests have been made.

He was known for his hand-crafted barbecue grills and custom fabrications, and made daily visits to Miracles Club and the Heavenly Taste café inside, dining for breakfast or dinner, striking up conversations with other club members, and observing card or dominoes games, Booker said.

Booker, 63, said he knew Gora going back decades, and his father bought a grill or two from him, but it wasn't until the last three years or so that he started seeing his neighbor on a daily basis, hanging out at the club.

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

Turnout in Multnomah County was only about 31 percent, which was lower than statewide results and a smaller percentage than the 2014 Primary Election in which turnout was almost 33 percent. The number of ballots counted, however, was greater -- both in Multnomah County and the state -- because there is a bigger population now than in 2014 and a larger number of registered voters, due in part to the motor voter effect in 2016.




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We Choose Love' Memorial

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

Obamas' Sign TV Netflix Deal

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(AP) -- Barack and Michelle derstanding between peoples, and Obama are getting into the television business with Monday's announcement that they had signed a multi-year deal with Netflix.

The former president and first lady have formed their own production company, Higher Ground Productions, for the material.

Netflix said the Obamas would make "a diverse mix of content," potentially including scripted and unscripted series, documentaries or features.

The former president appeared in January on David Letterman's Netflix talk show, "My Next Guest Needs No Introduction." Obama is said to be friendly with Ted Sarandos, the Netflix chief content officer.

Juneteenth Origin Debunked

Author corrects myths about the annual holiday

Donald Norman-Cox, a 64 year old resident of Denton, Texas has a message for the nation regarding next month's Juneteenth celebration: "Tell it right or stop talking." Since the mid-2000s, Mr. Norman-Cox has sporadically informed college and community groups that parts of the Juneteenth explanation are flagrantly wrong. This year, his message has muscle.

"Every explanation I've heard since childhood made little sense," Norman-Cox said. But like many others, he never bothered to search for facts. "I wondered how news of the proclama-

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than it floated across the states. How did news reach what is now New Mexico without going through Texas? When did other states free their slaves?'

Those quandaries and more are addressed in Norman-Cox's new book Juneteenth 101. The book debunks several widely held myths about Juneteenth, including its primary tenet: news of the Proclamation didn't reach Texas for two and a half years.

"You hear that everywhere, but it's wrong," Norman-Cox said. "Delayed emancipation was not caused by not-knowing. The culprit was lack of enforcement."

Norman-Cox admits to holding a near life-long hope that

others had researched their explanations. "I challenged nothing," he laughs, "until one question refused to be ignored." That question was why do Texans commemorate both Watchnight and Juneteenth?

Watchnight was the night slaves held vigils to watch for freedom, courtesy of the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth occurred supposedly because no one knew the Proclamation existed. Norman-Cox said, "Those opposing explanations coexist peacefully only in minds of the oblivious.'

While digging for clarification, he discovered some Texans knew about the Emancipation Proclamation before it was issued.

"On September 15, 1862, a newspaper in tiny Clarksville, Texas reported Lincoln was about to issue 'a proclamation of general universal emancipation.' Nine days later, Lincoln issued his preliminary proclamation. What little guys knew, the big ones did, too," he said.

That and other discoveries are packed in his new book.

Norman-Cox calls his findings, "Earth shaking, but nothing new." He said, "Professional historians - which I'm not - have known these facts probably since emancipation became a topic worthy of scholarly examination. This book translates existing academic discourse into street speak ... to help Big Mama and Ray-Ray 'nem not be wrong."



"They" refers to slave owners," Norman-Cox contends. "What slaves knew was irrelevant. Their walking off the job is called running away, not emanci-

According to Norman-Cox, Juneteenth falsehoods are pervasive. Even Congress incorrectly refers to Juneteenth as "the day slavery ended in the United States." Juneteenth 101 identifies 31 congressional resolutions that include or were defended by that statement. "As if six months later, the Thirteenth Amendment did nothing," Cox added.

To replace that inaccuracy the book offers this explanation, "Juneteenth celebrates the end of slavery; not the day slavery end-

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Gorge Express Bus Returns

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

During a time where America couldn't be more politically and economically polarized, it's time to change the moral narrative in this country by coming together under moral clarity. We must shift the national conversation from "right versus left" to "right versus wrong."

De La Salle North was the first school to replicate the innovative Corporate Work Study Program pioneered by Cristo Rey Jesuit High School in Chicago. The school was founded to provide this unique educational opportunity to families who would not be able to afford a private, college-preparatory education.

"Our goal is to develop tomorrow's community leaders by making high-quality education accessible to motivated young people in a learning environment that values cultural, spiritual and ethnic diversity," O'Mara said.
