

Inappropriate protests feared after two killed in attack

Portland Mayor Ted Wheeler urged officials and organizers Monday to cancel a "Trump Free Speech Rally" and other similar events, saying they are inappropriate and could be dangerous after two men were stabbed to death on a MAX train as they tried to help a pair of young women targeted by an anti-Muslim tirade.

Wheeler said he hopes the victims will inspire "changes in the political dialogue in this country."

Taliesin Myrddin Namkai Meche, 23, and Ricky John Best, 53, were killed Friday as they tried to stop Jeremy Joseph Christian from harassing the women on the light-rail train near the Hollywood Transit Center in northeast Portland, one of whom was wearing a hijab, authorities said. Another who stepped in was seriously injured.

Christian's social media postings indicate an affinity for Nazis and political vio-

lence. He is accused of aggravated murder, intimidation — the state equivalent of a hate crime — and being a felon in possession of a weapon.

The federal government has issued a permit for the free-speech rally Saturday and has yet to give a permit for an event June 10. The mayor says his main concern was participants "coming to peddle a message of hatred," saying hate speech is not protected by the Constitution.

A Facebook page for the event says

there would be speakers and live music in "one of the most liberal areas on the West Coast." It says it will feature Kyle Chapman, who describes himself as an American nationalist and ardent supporter of President Donald Trump.

Chapman was arrested at a March 4 protest in Berkeley, the birthplace of the U.S. free speech movement in the 1960s that has become a flashpoint for the extreme left and right since Trump's election.

The University of California, Berkeley,

has been criticized for canceling an appearance by conservative commentator Ann Coulter in April and another by right-wing provocateur Milo Yiannopoulos in February. It canceled Coulter's speech amid threats of violence, fearing a repeat of rioting ahead of the Yiannopoulos event.

Trump has condemned the stabbing, writing Monday on Twitter: "The violent attacks in Portland on Friday are unacceptable. The victims were standing up to hate and intolerance. Our prayers are w/ them."

Wheeler said he appreciated Trump's words but stressed the need for action.

I hope we rise to the memory of these two gentlemen who lost their lives," the mayor told reporters. "Let's do them honor by standing with them and carrying on their legacy of standing up to hate and bigotry and violence."

The mother of one of the targets of the rant said she was overwhelmed with gratitude and sadness for the strangers who died defending her daughter, 16-year-old Destinee Mangum.


Tiger Woods cited for DUI

Part 5. WHIPLASH: It doesn't take a serious accident to cause serious damage.

How bad an accident does it take to actually cause whiplash? : While most people think of whiplash only as the result of a rear end collision, it can occur as a

result of a fall or other sudden jolt. In car collisions, speeds as low as 5 MPH (a brisk walk) have caused whiplash. What's more, major studies show there is virtually no correlation between damage to the car and its occupants.

How can I tell if whiplash has happened to me?

Whiplash often exhibits symptoms such as a sore neck, arm or shoulder, nausea, blurred vision and headaches. If not treated immediately, these problems can lead to other more severe ones. To complicate matters, it sometimes takes years before whiplash symptoms occur.

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

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

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

It's Worth Asking: What would Jesus cut?

A budget that takes aim at the poor

What would Jesus cut? Several years ago, Sojourners asked that question, leading a campaign to remind our leaders in Washington that a budget is a moral doc-

ument. Our faith tells us that the moral test of a society is how it treats the poor. As a country, we face difficult choices, but whether or not we defend vulnerable people should not be one of them.

As we look at the priorities outlined in the Trump Administration's 2018 budget, we know what Donald Trump would cut. His budget calls for more than \$800 billion in cuts to Medicaid, which takes away health care from about 10 million people. His budget would slash the Children's Health Insurance Program, the Social Security Disability Insurance program, Meals on Wheels, and federal funding for Habitat in America by cutting SNAP (formerly

food stamps) by more than 25 percent and eliminating federal funding for subsidized school

Before he began his public ministry, Jesus fasted for 40 days. When he returned to Galilee, he proclaimed in his first sermon that "The Spirit of the

Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor." The word in the original language for "good news" is "evangel" from which we get the word "evangelical." So as an evangelical, I know that good news to the poor is at the core of Jesus' message.

The budget released by the Trump administration is anything but "good news" for the poor. It would be terrible news for those whom Jesus called "the least of these," the central focus in his final sermon that also calls upon "the nations" to protect the most vulnerable.

Leaders in the faith community must stand up to these deeply flawed priori-

for Humanity. It would worsen hunger ties, to say that the choice to protect the statements by requiring the king (the rich instead of the poor in the name of deficit reduction is an immoral one. Demonizing the poor and slashing programs that benefit low-income people — while refusing to scrutinize the much larger subsidies we provide to the wealthy — is hypocritical and cruel.

> Many of us, across our Christian families, believe that global health programs that save children's lives and food aid to nations about to experience famines are more important to Jesus than tax cuts for the rich.

> President Trump calls for a \$43 billion increase in military funding next year, reversing the biblical instruction to beat our swords into plowshares. Instead, the proposed budget cuts would beat plowshares into more swords.

> Some argue that the biblical mandate to protect the poor is meant to apply only to individuals, or to the church – not to governments. The Scriptures say otherwise. In the Old Testament, the biblical prophets consistently condemn injustice to the poor and frequently follow their

government) to act justly.

We as Christian individuals – and we as a nation – will be judged by our actions. We should all commit to improving the effectiveness of government programs, including those serving the poor.

But the Trump budget is not an attempt at reform; it's a heartless knifeslash to those who are struggling just to feed themselves and their families. The priorities of this budget are not consistent with Christian, Jewish, or Muslim values. They are not only bad economics, they are also bad religion; as we say in the evangelical community they are unbiblical.

It is now up to Congress to set their own priorities and to present their own budgets. It is therefore time once again to ask our elected officials - especially those who call themselves people of faith: What would Jesus cut?

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

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

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

Cemented in History

Paratrooper unit honored with new marker

A new historical marker will be dedicated in Oregon Saturday to honor an elite, all-black paratrooper unit deployed to the state near the end of World War II.

The 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion, also known as the Triple Nickles,

1945 during a secret mission known as "Operation Firefly." Their charge was to parachute near forest fires in the Pacific Northwest caused by Japanese balloon bombs, and disarm and destroy any remaining explosive devices.

The men withstood many obstacles in their service to the U.S., including racism, lack of smoke jumping equipment, and a fatality in their unit during an Oregon jump -- Private First Class Marvin L.

jumped their way into Oregon history in Brown. The new marker will also honor oneers Secretary Gwen Carr. Brown's sacrifice.

Roger Brandt of the Illinois Valley Community Development Organization was instrumental in the new marker's nomination, research, and funding process.

"Oregon has never formally thanked the 555th for their role in defending Oregon during World War II," Brandt said. "The 555th historical marker installation is taking the first step towards acknowledging their contribution to our state's history."

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

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
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
