### Sessions Visit Met With Resistance

## Protestors, mayor oppose his law and order plea

Portland pushed back against Jeff Sessions who visited Portland Monday to meet with law enforcement officials to ask them to cooperate with the Trump Administration to enforce their immigration policies.

Demonstrators from Portland's Resistance, Milenio, Voz Hispana Cambio Comunitario and others were present at all stages of Sessions' visit to protest his anti-immigration policies, criminal justice initiatives, racism, and the Trump Administration in general.


Mayor Ted Wheeler, who refused to attend the meeting in protest, sent a letter to Sessions outlying

why he opposed meeting with him and clarifying Oregon's sanctuary laws.

Oregon state law dating back to 1987 prohibits state and local police from enforcing federal immigration law," Wheeler wrote.

Wheeler also said he opposes the Trump Administration's threats to pull funding from sanctuary cities and states and condemned the administration's revocation of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), which protects child immigrants, known as "Dreamers," from being deported.

"Dreamers were brought to the United States as children, through no decision of their own. This is the only country they have ever called home. Dreamers today are applying their talents to make a positive difference in our society. We should embrace Dreamers, not reject them," Wheeler said.



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### The Week in Review

#### **Lombard Crash at 15th Avenue Kills 2 People**

Two people were killed, including a 12-year-old, and four other were seriously injured in a catastrophic car crash on Northeast 15th and Lombard Street Monday night. Police said a car was traveling west on Lombard at a high speed when it crashed into a pickup truck traveling the opposite direction.

### **Protest Legal Observer Claims Police Brutality**

The Portland chapter of the National Lawyers Guild says they are "outraged" over a Portland police officer who was filmed shoving a volunteer legal observer during a September 10 downtown protest and have filed a tort claim against the city of Portland. The use of force at the rally, where seven arrests were made, is being reviewed by the Portland police.

#### **Amazon Hiring 1,000 for North Portland Facility**

On Monday, Amazon announced plans to open a fulfillment center in the Rivergate Industrial area of north Portland, which would create more than 1,000 fulltime jobs. Troutdale and Salem were previously announced by the online retailer as future sites of similar warehouses, where the facility will fill, pack, and ship online orders.

#### Man Found Shot after Report of Gunfire, Later Dies

Police responded to multiple reports of gunfire about 1:40 a.m. at the 3600 block of Southeast 28th Avenue on Sunday. Wilbert "Billy" Butler, 27, was found with multiple gunshot wounds and was rushed to the hospital, where he died hours later, officials said.

### **Police Acquittal Sparks Rage**

Protests that started peacefully Friday night in St. Louis over a judge's decision to acquit a white former police officer in the shooting death of a Lamar Smith, a 24-year-old black man, culminated in more than 80 arrests on Sunday as police officers chanted "whose streets, our streets." A night earlier, demonstrators blocked highways, damaged property,



and threw rocks at the St. Louis mayor's house and bricks at police officers.

### **Lifesaving Transplant for Gomez**

Actress-singer Selena Gomez, who has lupus, revealed Thursday that she got a kidney transplant from television actress Francia Raisa. Gomez, who had been in and out of the spotlight over the summer due to recovering from the procedure, calls the surgery "what I needed to do for my overall health."

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




despite an accomplished track record that included establishing the Multnomah County Public Health Advisory Board and overseeing the development of an equity-focused Community Health Improvement Plan.

The dismissal occurred just six weeks after returning from approved Family Medical Leave Tillman took in April to care for her mother, who had stage 4 lung cancer. Tillman is currently asking for higher severance pay than the four month pay initially offered and acknowledgement of her unfair treatment.

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


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## Smith to Run for City Council

### Field widens after Saltzman decides not to run for re-election

Multnomah County Commissioner Loretta Smith has thrown her name into a May election for Portland City Council seeking a position that will become vacant when Dan Saltzman steps down at the end of his term next year.

Smith announced her intentions last week after weeks of speculation about her future. Term limits prevents her from running for re-election as a county commissioner. Her new candidacy came after Saltzman announced he would not seek another term after more than two decades in office.

Smith has been in public service for her entire professional life, first serving with U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden for 21 years, and then as a Multnomah County Commissioner for the past seven years.

She has built her credentials in government by advocating for disadvantaged populations and other people left behind, such as creating jobs for young people of color, educating seniors about scams, and fighting the opioid epidemic.

"The opportunity to continue to fight for the most vulnerable on the Portland City Council would be an honor and a privilege," Smith said in a news release announcing her candidacy. "Our next leaders need to build a shared vision for Portland's future and ensure it remains affordable for working people, stand up for pro-



gressive values, and provide every community a meaningful voice in City Hall."

Smith will be the second person from the African American community to run for Saltzman's post. JoAnn Hardesty, the president of the Portland NAACP and a former state representative from Portland announced her candidacy earlier and even challenged Saltzman to step down to open the seat up for new leader-

On Monday, a third candidate, Felicia Williams, also announced her plans to run for the office.






The purpose is for audiences to laugh uncomfortably and involuntarily at this skewering and rewriting of a shared heritage, and to consider how it haunts contemporary life.

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

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


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## Protecting 'Dreamers' is the Right Thing to D

### Deportation would be shameful

"As the leaders of communities across the country-individuals and institutions that have seen these young people grow up in

our communities—we recognize how they have enriched and strengthened our cities, states, schools, businesses, congregations, and families. We believe it is a moral imperative that the administration and the country know we are with them. We also join together to send our assurances to Dreamers: we see you, we value you, and we are ready to defend you." - An open letter signed by more than 1,800 governors, attorneys general, mayors, state representatives, judges, police chiefs and other leaders.

An overwhelming majority of voters – about 85 percent - are opposed to for the Deferred Action for Childhood

Arrivals (DACA) program. These 'Dreamers," as they are known, were brought into the United States as children, most of them younger than 7. About 90 percent of Dreamers are employed; more than 70 percent have attended college.

Despite widespread for allowing Dreamers to remain, the Trump Administration has acquiesced to 10 state attorneys general who threatened to sue if it did not end the program. But even President Trump does not want to deport Dreamers.

"Does anybody really want to throw out good, educated and accomplished young people who have jobs, some serving in the military?" he wrote on Twitter. "Really!..."

Sadly, many of the people who voted for him do, and voted for him because he said he would do it. But even among the most hard-core supporters of the President, those who say they "strong-

deporting immigrants who are eligible ly approve" of his performance, only a third favor deportation of Dreamers.

> Earlier this month, 15 states and the District of Columbia filed a suit seeking to stop the repeal of DACA. California just filed a separate lawsuit, which was joined by Maine, Minnesota, and Maryland. Meanwhile, President Trump has struck a tentative agreement from the House and Senate Minority Leaders to support legislation protecting Dreamers in exchange for

enhanced border security.

While there is a chance that deportations of Dreamers will not occur, it's shameful that they should be in a position to fear it at all. Dreamers trusted the United States government in enrolling in the program, now that very trust could be used against them. There is no justification for ending the program even as a legislative solution is sought.

Protecting Dreamers is quite simply the right thing to do. It is the moral thing to do. It's the economically sound thing to do. And even though it shouldn't matter, it's the popular thing to do. We urge Congress to immediately pass legislation protecting Dreamers and call upon the Trump administration to reinstate DACA so no Dreamer has to fear deportation from the home they love.

## Militarizing Police under a Cloak of Secrecy

### A misguided reversal in police accountability

In a move that will further militarize police departments across the country while decreasing accountability, the President issued an executive order that strips away limits

on weapons of war that the Defense Department can hand over to state and local police forces.

The President's order expands an existing Pentagon program that authorizes the transfer of military-grade tactical weapons, surveillance equipment and vehicles to civilian police departments, eliminating restrictions on the types of weapons that can be transferred and vastly reducing oversight of the program.

The weapons program became notorious when police fitted with battle gear were photographed pointing assault weapons at protesters in the streets of Ferguson, Mo. After the images went viral, then-President Barack Obama issued an executive order that placed restrictions on the program and established reporting, oversight and training requirements for law enforcement agencies requesting the military equipment.

The Obama-era order prohibited weapons like bayonets and gre-

nade-launchers from being transferred to local law enforcement. Reversing the ban, the Trump order places weapons designed to be used by soldiers on battlefields in the hands of police, opening the door to intimidation and abuse of civilians which could result in a chilling and local police departments to get basic figures on the amount and type of equipment that local police and sheriffs received, exposing just how prevalent the program is across the country.

Now, even those minimal accountability measures have been stripped

ceiving the equipment. By expanding the program and decreasing safeguards to prevent abuse, the President increases the likelihood that dangerous weapons could fall into the hands of individuals who intend to do us harm.

It now falls to Congress to push back against the creeping authoritarianism evidenced by the President's decision to further militarize law enforcement while shackling oversight. To preempt this administration's misguided actions, Congress must, at a minimum,

effect on public dissent and protest.

At the same time, abuses will be harder to detect. The President's executive order will scrap minimal transparency requirements that had applied to the already secretive program, leaving the public in the dark about dangerous weaponry flowing into their communities.

Just last month, a government watchdog agency released a shocking assessment of the Pentagon program, exposing how easy it is for military weapons to fall into the wrong hands. Posing as a fake law enforcement agency, investigators requested and received over a million dollars in rifles, pipe bomb equipment, and night vision goggles after the Defense Department failed to verify the identity of individuals reassert its oversight authority and put in place requirements to ensure that if any transfers are permitted, they are subject to transparency mandates and that the Pentagon and police departments remain accountable to the public.

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
